




# YAB Member, Carmel, received a RAD Hero Award

# Meet Jessica Blakemore



Jessica is a Senior Policy & Legislative Analyst for Alameda County's Health Care Services Agency, where she is responsible for overseeing and aligning external policies related to public health issues, such as homelessness. She hosted an informational workshop for the YAB about the county's legislative platforms and processes, and planted the seed for YAB members to be involved with the Personnel. Administration and Legislation (PAL) Committee in the future.

#### The majority (87%) of County appropriations are dedicated to public services.

9,747 individuals experiencing homelessness during a single 24-hour period. Alameda County continues to invest in anti-homeless strategies, including the 2016 voter-approved Measure A1 General Obligation Bond, with the goal of crating and preserving 3,800 units of affordable housing rental and ownership housing throughout Alameda County.

Every year, the Housing & Homelessness (H&H) Services agency updates their CE Policy Handbook which governs how providers are expected to operate their CE access points and services.

This year, the YAB was requested to give feedback on policy changes and language clarity, a process that allowed youth to have a role in shaping CE access, assessment, prioritization, and navigation resources. We reviewed with the lens of understanding the policy, clarity of policy language and thinking about if anything is missing in terms of translating this info for the wider community to understand.



### Bid you know that non-CoC funded organizations can participate in the annual Sheltered, Paint, In, Time, Count,P

The Sheltered PIT Count tracks the number of unhoused individuals who are enrolled in a Safe Haven. emergency, transitional or rapid-rehousing shelter. It also tracks the county's total housing inventory. The Sheltered PIT Count occurs every year in January. Shelters that receive funding from the CoC are required by HUD to participate in the count, but non-CoC funded shelters can contribute as well!

By encouraging all shelters to participate in the count, we can capture the most accurate data on the local housing capacity and whom it is serving.

#### Youth and Allies Against Homelessness (YAAH) Webinar

On March 11th, 2024, YAAH formally introduced the guidelines in a webinar that is now available to view on their website. The Guidelines to Prevent, Address, and End Youth Homelessness contain a comprehensive roadmap of interventions that communities can adapt to their specific contexts and needs. The guidelines were developed as part of an evaluation funded by the California Interagency Council on Homelessness (Cal ICH) of the Homeless Housing and Prevention (HHAP) youth-set-aside funds in California.

The YAB visits West Coast Children's Clinic (WCCC) "Youth Advocate Program"



Located in Oakland, the WCCC is a behavioral health center serving families and children. Their 3-year Youth Advocate Program (YAP) employs foster youth to be key informers, decision-makers, and advocates for youth services. They play a central role in training service providers across the county on best policies and practices, as well as assisting with youth-centered projects tasked by the county.

## **2024 Youth Empowerment Summit in Sacramento**

We're grateful to have returned to this collaborative and empowering space that connects us with young leaders from all over California to empower each other to advocate for youth housing rights, strengthen our resource network, and form new friendships with our long-distance peers. This year we advocated to our state representatives for support on these bills:

- 1.SB 1079: Youth Housing Bond Act 2024 (Menjivar)
- 2. AB 2477: Foster Youth Savings (Zbur)
- 3. AB2520: Youth Specific Coordinated Entry Response System (Ramos)
- 4. Increase of the HHAP youth set-aside allocation from a 10% to 25% minimum to address funding gaps in youth services.

#### YAB Member Ray sits on California Coalition for Youth's "State Youth Advisory Board"

Due to Ray's immense advocacy efforts and collaboration with CCY, Ray has been offered the opportunity to join the California State YAB. This board is one of the state's biggest coalitions for youth empowerment; young people discuss issues affecting transition-aged youth in California (ages 12-24), including legislation and policy issues, and make recommendations to the CCY Board of Directors. This gives ambitious youth leadership opportunities towards CCY's mission, to improve and empower the lives of California's youth, and vision, that every youth in California is connected to the

services, resources, and programs they need to have successful lives.





#### The YAB Communications Subcommittee wrote a letter of support to the California Legislature Position Letter Portal

SB 1079 aims to address the housing needs of young people, especially those transitioning out of foster care or experiencing homelessness. It authorizes the issuance of government bonds to fund affordable housing units for youth, including grants for housing assistance programs. The goal is to provide stable, safe, and affordable housing solutions to help young people achieve self-sufficiency. The YAB supported this bill by writing a supportive

letter to the legislature stating our support and need for AB 1079. We encourage the community to please write a letter of support to promote the need of housing for YOUTH.

Hosted in Hayward by the YAB and H&H staff, this convening highlighted three main topics:

- 1. The needs of undocumented migrant youth experiencing homelessness presented by the Newcomer Navigation Center
- 2. Findings from a research on CAL-ICH presented by UC Berkeley's Youth Allies Against Homelessness research team
- 3. What is Housing Problem Solving presented by YHDP Peer Navigators

The YAB also shared recent updates on the progression of goals in our "Youth Action A Way Home" plan and held space for partners to share their progress as well. As the purpose of this Collaborative is to embed cross-collaboration within our homeless response system and promote alignment of shared goals, efforts and resources in the community, we're honored to see an increasing attendance that reached over 40 participants at this convening.

Total number of people experiencing homelessness on any given night: 9,450

#### Of this...

6,343 people were living unsheltered.

3% decrease from 2022

- 9,450 people were staying in a shelter project.
  19% increase from 2022
- 428 homeless youth were counted. 51% decrease from 2022.

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
